A. DIVISION 0–BIDDING AND CONTRACTING REQUIREMENTS

1. SECTION 00200-INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

- a. Page 00200-10, ARTICLE 23-WAGE RATE DETERMINATION

REPLACE Paragraph 23.01 with the following:

“23.01 All applicable laws, ordinances, and the rules and regulations of all authorities having jurisdiction over construction of the PROJECT shall apply to the Contract throughout including the Employment of Illinois Workers on Public Works Act (30 ILCS 570) and the Davis-Bacon Wage Act (40 USC 276a through 276a-5) as defined by the United States Department of Labor. Wage rates are bound in these specifications. Bidders shall inspect the wage rate determination and shall incorporate its requirements into their Bid. See General Requirements for additional requirements.”

2. SECTION 00400-BID

- a. Page 00400-7, Item E Screening Equipment

CHANGE “Parkson” to “Westech.”

3. SECTION 00800-SUPPLEMENTARY CONDITIONS

- a. Page 00800-11, SC-6.09 Laws and Regulations

CHANGE “Illinois Citizens Act” to “Employment of Illinois Workers on Public Works Act (30 ILCS 570).”

ADD the following to the end of the second sentence of Paragraph 6:

“or secondary effluent downstream of the existing tertiary filters.”

- b. Page 01060-2, SECTION 01060–REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS, PART 1–GENERAL, Paragraph 1.05

REPLACE the last sentence of Paragraph A with the following:

“Wage rates are attached at the end of Division 1.”

ADD Paragraph E as follows:

“E. CONTRACTOR shall comply with United States Department of Labor regulations, 29 CFR parts 1, 3, and 5 which are incorporated herein by reference in this Contract.”

CHANGE post size to “Schedule 40, 1 1/2 inch diameter pipe” in Paragraph C.

CHANGE “five-year” to “two-year” in Paragraph A.

ADD Paragraph B as follows:

“B. Provide manufacturer’s standard five-year product warranty.”

- b. Page 07120-2, SECTION 07120-FLUID APPLIED WATERPROOFING, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.01

CHANGE “Tremproof 60” to “Tremproof 201/60” in Paragraph B.

- c. Page 07900-1, SECTION 07900-CAULKING AND SEALANTS, PART 1-GENERAL, Paragraph 1.03

ADD Paragraph C. as follows:

“C. Submit copies of warranty.”

- d. Page 07900-1, SECTION 07900-CAULKING AND SEALANTS, PART 1-GENERAL, Paragraph 1.04

CHANGE “guaranteed watertight for five years” to “guaranteed watertight by installer for two years” in Paragraph A.

ADD Paragraph B as follows:

“B. Provide manufacturer’s standard five-year product warranty.”

- d. Page 07900-1, SECTION 07900-CAULKING AND SEALANTS, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.02

CHANGE “Vulkem 45” to “Vulkem 45 SSL” in Paragraph B.2.

- e. Page 07900-2, SECTION 07900-CAULKING AND SEALANTS, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.03

CHANGE “Vulken 45 by Tremco Inc.” to “Thiokol 2235M by Polyspec” in Paragraph B.2.

- f. Page 07900-2, SECTION 07900-CAULKING AND SEALANTS, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.04

CHANGE “Sika Duoflex NS/SL” to “Sika Duoflex NS or Thiokol 2235M by Polyspec.” in Paragraph B.

REPLACE Paragraph A with the following:

“A. Provide manufacturer’s lifetime warranty against failure due to corrosion and ten-year warranty against defects in materials and workmanship.”

b. Page 08800-1, SECTION 08800-GLAZING, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.01

CHANGE "Interpane Glass Company" to "Oldcastle Glass Company" in Paragraph B.

REPLACE Paragraph C with the following:

"C. Glass shall be Low-E clear."

## 6. DIVISION 11-EQUIPMENT

a. Page 11300-2, SECTION 11300-CENTRIFUGAL VERTICAL NON CLOG WASTEWATER PUMPS, PART 1-GENERAL, Paragraph 1.04

DELETE Paragraph in its entirety.

b. Page 11314-1, SECTION 11314-PROGRESSING CAVITY PUMPS, PART 1-GENERAL, Paragraph 1.03

DELETE paragraph B in its entirety.

c. Page 11331-2, SECTION 11331-SCREENING EQUIPMENT, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.01 A

ADD "Vulcan" after "Westech" and before "or equal" in the first sentence.

d. Page 11337-1, SECTION 11337-FINAL CLARIFIER COLLECTORS, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.01

ADD "Walker Process and Westec" before "or equal" in paragraph A.

e. Page 11337-6, SECTION 11337-FINAL CLARIFIER COLLECTORS, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.04

CHANGE the running torque value in Paragraph F to "19,000 ft lbs."

CHANGE the minimum pitch diameter worm gear to "12."

f. Page 11349-2, SECTION 11349-CHEMICAL PHOSPHORUS REMOVAL EQUIPMENT, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.01

ADD "Prominent" immediately after "LMI Milton Roy" in paragraph A.

## 7. DIVISION 14-CONVEYING SYSTEMS

a. Page 14600-2, SECTION 14600-HOISTS AND CRANES, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.04

CHANGE Paragraph A to read as follows:

"A. All wiring and controls shall be NEMA 4X. Hoist and trolley motors shall be open drip proof."

CHANGE Paragraph B to read as follows:

"B. The hoist and trolley shall be controlled by radio control. Provide a total of two radio controls to the OWNER. Both the hoist and trolley shall be provided with the necessary equipment to be controlled via radio control as necessary by manufacturer."

DELETE paragraph D in its entirety.

b. Page 14600-3, SECTION 14600-HOISTS AND CRANES, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.05

CLARIFICATION: No portable hoists are to be provided as part of this contract, only hoist bases.

c. Page 14600-3, SECTION 14600-HOISTS AND CRANES, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.06

CLARIFICATION: The hand winch shall consist of a hand winch and wire rope. See detail A/75-DASM-01 for further details.

## 8. DIVISION 16-ELECTRICAL

a. Page 16480-7, SECTION 16480-MOTOR CONTROL, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.07.E

CLARIFICATION: Variable frequency drives shall be as manufactured by Toshiba, no equal, as stated in Paragraph 2.01.A.

b. Page 16480-8, SECTION 16480-MOTOR CONTROL, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.07.A

CLARIFICATION: MCC and MCC Drawings shall be furnished by 16940 Systems Supplier. See Specification Section 16940, 1.02.B for further information.

c. Page 16480-9, SECTION 16480-MOTOR CONTROL, PART 2-PRODUCTS, Paragraph 2.07.G

CLARIFICATION: Vertical wireways shall not be required for Oxidation ditch aerator VFD MCC sections.

d. Page 16940-36, SECTION 1694 -CONTROLS AND INSTRUMENTATION, PART 3-EXECUTION, Paragraph 3.02.A

CLARIFICATION: This control panel shall have minimum dimensions as indicated and shall be a maximum of 30 inches wide.

## C. DRAWINGS

### 1. SHEET NO. 8-DEMOLITION PLAN

CLARIFICATION: In general, conduit below grade and underground process piping within the limits of the excavations for new structures, all abandoned conduit above grade, and all abandoned wire throughout the site shall be removed. All other conduit below grade and underground process piping may be abandoned in place.

2. SHEET NO. 9–LOCATION PLAN

CLARIFICATION: New sidewalk width shall be 5'-0" wide.

3. SHEET NO. 10–SITE GRADING PLAN

CLARIFICATION: New sidewalk width shall be 5'-0" wide.

ADD General Note 2 as follows:

"2. Provide stone mulch, fabric membrane, and edging beneath exterior stairs and landings at Oxidation Ditch (three locations), Clarifier No. 1 (one location), and Clarifier No. 2 (one location). See individual structure plans for stair and landing locations and dimensions."

4. SHEET NO. 11–EXCESS FILL GRADING PLAN

CHANGE general note 5 to read as follows:

"Estimated volume of excess fill to be disposed of is approximately 18,500 CY. Contractor shall be responsible for verifying this quantity prior to bidding and is ultimately responsible for disposing of all excess fill from the project site."

ADD general note 6 to read as follows:

"The plan's intent is to show the excess fill area intended for all site excavation spoils. OWNER will allow contractor to dispose of quantities less or more than indicated in the estimated volume. The plan's intent is to show the general area of the disposal site as well as preliminary grades. Additional fill does not need to be hauled in to make up the difference between the estimated amount and actual quantities."

ADD general note 7 to read as follows:

"Clearing and grubbing of the site shall be completed as necessary to dispose of excess fill."

5. SHEET NO. 16–SCREENING BUILDING LOWER LEVEL PLAN

DELETE EL. 707.25 shown in the southwest corner of the PRC tank containment.

CHANGE the floor elevation of the PRC tank containment in the northwest corner from "645.40" to "645.50."

CHANGE the floor elevation of the PRC tank containment in the southwest corner from "645.30" to "645.40."

CHANGE the floor elevation of the PRC tank containment in the northwest corner from "645.50" to "645.40."

CLARIFICATION: PRC tank containment floor shall drain to sump.

ADD Key Note 18 to Detail A/20-ASM-02 to read as follows:

"A 1/2-inch PRC line to Detail A/20-ASM-02 and route to splitter box downstream of STG-20-05 on Sheet 17. CONTRACTOR shall provide an isolation valve, insulation, and heat trace as

required.”

ADD general note 3 to read as follows:

“PRC piping shall be run along walls and penetrate floor along walls. CONTRACTOR shall route piping 36 inches above finished floor (AFF). Where not possible to route 36 inches AFF provide drip tray or double walled containment piping.”

6. SHEET NO. 17-SCREENING BUILDING-UPPER LEVEL AND SPLITTER BOX PLAN

ADD general note 4 to read as follows:

“PRC piping shall be run along walls and penetrate floor along walls. CONTRACTOR shall route piping 36 inches above finished floor (AFF). Where not possible to route 36 inches AFF provide drip tray or double walled containment piping.”

7. SHEET NO. 19-SCREENING BUILDING SECTIONS

CLARIFICATION: The gable end walls are to be built according to GABLE END WALL DETAIL 20-ASM-04. SECTIONS 1 AND 2 incorrectly show a gable truss. DETAIL 20-ASM-04 correctly shows a 2"x4" stud wall.

CLARIFICATION: Crushed stone and geotextile fabric is not required under the Oxidation Ditch Influent Splitter Box and channel connection to Screening Building shown in Sections 6, 7, and 8. These structures will be constructed on compacted granular fill.

8. SHEET NO. 28-OXIDATION DITCH-OVERALL PLAN AND DETAILS

ADD Key Note 3 to the north side of the oxidation ditch as follows:

“3. Provide steel sheet pile wall as required to protect existing road during oxidation ditch excavation. Road must remain in service during construction. Contractor to design sheet piling for earth and truck traffic loads.”

9. SHEET NO. 31-OXIDATION DITCH SECTIONS

CLARIFICATION: The exterior wall reinforcing shown in the right side of SECTION 2 is typical for the exterior curved wall between the construction joints located at 30 degrees from the southeast curvature point and approximately 36 degrees from the southwest curvature point. The construction joints are shown on Sheet No. 28.

CLARIFICATION: The bottom mat of reinforcing (north-south orientation) in the thickened portion of the base slab beneath the BNR No. 1 tank shown in the left side of SECTIONS 1 and 2 shall be #6@12”.

CLARIFICATION: The #7@8” top mat slab reinforcing shown in the right side of SECTION 2 shall extend from the south end of the base slab to the slab construction joint located at the wall radius point. DELETE the arrow pointing from the #6@12” note to the north-south top mat reinforcing shown at the right side of SECTION 2.

10. SHEET NO. 32-OXIDATION DITCH SECTIONS

CHANGE base slab thickness from “ 1'-0” “ to “ 1'-3” “ in SECTION 8.

CHANGE the crushed stone mat thickness from " 8" " to " 12" " in the note identifying the stone mat under the base slab in SECTION 3.

CLARIFICATION: A 12-inch crushed stone mat and geotextile fabric are required under the entire Oxidation Ditch base slab area.

CLARIFICATION: The exterior wall reinforcing shown in SECTION 3 shall extend beyond the straight exterior walls to the first construction joints in the curved south portion of the ditch located at 30 degrees from the southeast curvature point and approximately 36 degrees from the southwest curvature point. The construction joints are shown on Sheet No. 28.

CLARIFICATION: The #7@12" bottom mat slab reinforcing and the #7@6" top mat slab reinforcing shown in SECTION 3 shall extend to the first wall construction joint located 30 degrees into the curved exterior wall at the south end of the oxidation ditch. This reinforcing shall be lapped with the east-west reinforcing shown in SECTION 2 on Sheet No. 21.

#### 11. SHEET NO. 33--OXIDATION DITCH SECTIONS AND DETAILS

CHANGE base slab thickness from " 2'-0" " to " 1'-0" " in SECTION 11.

CLARIFICATION: A 12-inch crushed stone mat and geotextile fabric are required under the entire Mixed Liquor Division Box base slab area.

#### 12. SHEET NO. 37--FINAL CLARIFIERS SECTIONS AND DETAILS

CHANGE the crushed stone mat thickness from " 6" " to " 12" " in the note identifying the stone mat under the base slab in SECTION 1.

CLARIFICATION: A geotextile fabric is required under the crushed stone mat per specifications.

#### 13. SHEET NO. 38--CHLORINE CONTACT TANK

CHANGE "granular backfill" to "crushed stone backfill" in the backfill note under the base slab shown in SECTION 1.

CLARIFICATION: A geotextile fabric is required under the crushed stone backfill per specifications.

CHANGE bottom mat of reinforcing steel from " #6@12" EW " to " #5@12" EW " in SECTION 2/60-ASM-01.

#### 14. SHEET NO. 40--RAS PUMPING BUILDING-PLAN AND SECTIONS

ADD general note 4 to read as follows:

"CONTRACTOR shall maintain NPW service without interruption to OWNER."

#### 15. SHEET NO. 48--SLUDGE DRYING BEDS PLAN

ADD Guard Posts per Detail D/99-AS-01 at the west end of the exterior and interior divider walls (seven total required).

16. SHEET NO. 49-SLUDGE DRYING BEDS SECTIONS AND DETAILS

ADD a 4'-8" wide by 1'-0" thick continuous footing with #4@12" each way reinforcing in top face to the bottom of the 8" interior divider wall shown in SECTION 1. Top elevation of footing is EL. 638.00. The #4@8" stem reinforcing should be dowelled into the footing slab. This is typical for all interior 8" divider walls.

ADD a 4'-8" wide by 1'-0" thick continuous footing with #4@12" each way reinforcing in top face to the bottom of the 8" west end wall shown in SECTION 2. Top elevation of footing is EL. 638.00. The #4@8" stem reinforcing should be dowelled into the footing slab. This is typical along the west end of the drying bed.

CLARIFICATION: The EL. 642.00 shown in SECTION 3 is referring to the top elevation of the 6-inch slab with fibrous reinforcing. The slab is not identified. The FA-1 sand blanket is also required between the 6-inch slab and CA-13 granular drainage fill even though it is not shown.

CLARIFICATION: The compacted granular material note shown in SECTION 1 is referring to fill material beneath the drying bed that may be required to bring existing grade up to the bottom of the CA-13 granular drainage fill (after topsoil removal). See Drawing 05-C-02 for the site grading plan.

CLARIFICATION The compacted granular material note shown in SECTION 3 is referring to fill or backfill material behind walls required to fill wall excavation areas. This is typical for all exterior wall sections shown in SECTIONS 1,2, and 3. See Drawing 05-C-02 for the site grading plan.

17. SHEET NO. 63-ELECTRICAL MCC ELEVATIONS AND SCADA RISER

CLARIFICATION horizontal bus shall not be required in oxidation ditch aerator VFD sections. CONTRACTOR shall be allowed to cable between sections to extend bussing through these sections as required.

CHANGE the 400A feeder breaker for MCC-70B to 800A lugs. Lugs shall be provided as part of this project.

Group 1 - Frame Truck when used for transportation purposes; Air Compressor and Welding Machines, including those pulled by cars, pick-up trucks and tractors; Ambulances; Articulated Dumps; Batch Gate Lockers; Batch Hopperman; Car and Truck Washers; Carry Alls; Forl Lifts and Hoisters; Helpers; Mechanics Helpers and Greasers; Oil Distributors, two-man operation; Pavement Breakers; Pole Trailer, up to 40 feet; Pothole Repair Trucks; Power Mower Tractors; Quick Change Barrier; Self-Propelled Chip Spreader; Shipping and Receiving Clerks and Checkers; Skipman; Slurry Trucks, two-man operation; Slurry Trucks, Conveyor Operated - 2 or 3 man operation; Teamsters; Unskilled Dumpmen; Warehousemen and Dockmen; Truck Drivers hauling warning lights, barricades, and portable toilets on the job site

Group 2 - Dispatcher; Dump Crets and Adgetators under 7 yards; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnapulls or Turnatrailers when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment under 16 cubic yards; Mixer Trucks under 7 yards; Ready-Mix Plant Hopper Operator; Winch Trucks, 2 Axles

Group 3 - Dump Crets and Adgetators, 7 yards and over; Dumpsters, Track Trucks, Euclids, Hug Bottom Dump Turnapulls or Turnatrailers when pulling other than self-loading equipment or similar equipment over 16 cubic yards; Explosives and/or Fission Material Trucks; Mixer Trucks 7 yards or over; Mobile Cranes while in transit; Oil Distributors, one-man operation; Pole Trailer, over 40 feet; Pole and Expandable Trailers hauling material over 50 feet long; Slurry Trucks, one-man operation; Winch Trucks, 3 axles or more; Mechanic - \*Truck Welder and \*Truck Painter\*These classifications shall only apply in areas where and when it has been a past area practice; Asphalt Plant Operators in areas where it has been past practice

Group 4 - Dual-purpose vehicels, such as mounted crane tucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic; Self-loading equipment like P.B. and trucks with scoops on the front

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WELDERS - Receive rate prescribed for craft performing operation to which welding is incidental.  
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Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (ii)).  
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In the listing above, the "SU" designation means that rates listed under the identifier do not reflect collectively bargained wage and fringe benefit rates. Other designations

indicate unions whose rates have been determined to be prevailing.

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 WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- \* an existing published wage determination
- \* a survey underlying a wage determination
- \* a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- \* a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:

2.) If the answer to the question in 1.) is yes, then an interested party (those affected by the action) can request review and reconsideration from the Wage and Hour Administrator (See 29 CFR Part 1.8 and 29 CFR Part 7). Write to:

The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and by any information (wage payment data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.

3.) If the decision of the Administrator is not favorable, an interested party may appeal directly to the Administrative Review Board (formerly the Wage Appeals Board). Write to:
